## **Proposal Summary:**

Camp Abilities @ WCU is a 3-day summer camping experience that empowers youth who are blind and visually impaired through adapted sports. The camp serves 30+ blind and visually impaired youth from the ages of 7 to 18 who live in the mid-Atlantic region. The participants take part in a weekend overnight experience that introduces a variety of sports, games, and activities that teach and encourage them to be physically active, healthy and independent. WCU students practice their newly acquired adapted teaching skills in activities while absorbing teaching strategies from veteran adapted sports specialists. West Chester University provides the fields, facilities and housing for the weekend.

Support from local service clubs, businesses, and agencies are critical to the continued success of this experience. Staff support, including coaches and nurses, are 100% volunteers but without the support of the community, Camp Abilities cannot happen.

The funds we are requesting from the Chester County Community Foundation's donors will help cover the costs of meals and supplies, specifically from our "Cooking without Looking" program which is designed to empower the athlete to prepare nutritious meals with minimal assistance. This program is very popular with campers and their parents, but requires additional funding for food and supplies.

# 1. Nonprofit's history, goals, key achievements & distinctiveness

Camp Abilities is a concept formulated by Dr. Lauren Lieberman, a West Chester University (WCU) alumna, Class of 1997 and professor at SUNY-Brockport, who established the first camp over 20 years ago to empower youth who are blind and visually impaired through adapted sports.

Currently, there are five, one-week camps in locations around the country, from New York to Washington state and as far south as Puerto Rico. Locally, the 13<sup>th</sup> annual Camp Abilities PA will be held at West Chester University on Memorial Day Weekend 2020. The camp is run by Dr. Monica Lepore, a WCU professor, and is supported by WCU students currently enrolled in the Adapted Physical Activities minor. Staff members are pre-service special educators, physical therapists, occupational therapists, adapted PE teachers, ophthalmologists, and teachers of the visually impaired who are trained to work one-on-one with children at camp.

Camp Abilities provides children with visual impairments with instruction in sport and physical activity skills, opportunities to develop relationships with other campers who are visually impaired, access to positive role models that encourage independence, and instruction on developing healthy lifestyles. In addition, Camp Abilities' programs meet the educational, orientation and mobility, independent living, and vocational goals of a variety of students with one program. Participation in sport and physical activity reinforces aspects of the legally mandated expanded core curriculum for students with visual impairments, such as self-determination, sensory efficiency skills, social skills, and recreation and leisure skills. Finally, students with visual impairments have high rates of obesity, depression, unemployment, and dissatisfaction with their social situation. Programs that support health and physical activity help to fight negative stereotypes and health risk behaviors in young people with visual impairments.

The funds we are requesting from the Chester County Community Foundation's donors will help cover the costs of meals and supplies, specifically for our "Cooking without Looking" program which is designed to empower the athlete to prepare nutritious meals with minimal assistance.

#### Specific needs & issues to be addressed

This program is very popular with campers and their parents, but requires additional funding for food and supplies. Further, WCU Department of Nutrition, which supported the program in the past, is unable to this year due to staff and resource reductions.
