GRANT PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

- The Chester County Community Foundation connects people who care with the causes that matter,
 so their philanthropy makes a difference Now & Forever.
 - We are a collection of Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds with \$5M + granted annually to nonprofits in Chester County & beyond.
 - 99% of our grants are made by our generous Fund Advisors, who make grant decisions all year.

Nonprofits can submit proposals for 2 types of grants:

Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds (No Deadline)

- Grants focus on Chester County causes & issues, but are not limited to Chester County.
- Charitable nonprofits working in all fields of interest are considered for grant awards.
 - arts, culture & heritage
 - community improvement
 - education
 - environment
 - health
 - human services
 - religion
- General operating grants are encouraged. Nonprofits should be specific about their mission, goals, & measurable outcomes.
- ♦ Proposals can be submitted <u>anytime all year</u>.
- Grant decisions are made intermittently all year, as Fund Advisors desire.
- ♦ Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$7,500.

Fund for Chester County Capacity Building Grants (Due 9/15)

- ♦ For eligibility in this grant program, nonprofits must be located in & serve Chester County.
- Nonprofits budgets must be \$500,000 or less.
- The goal of capacity building grantmaking is to strengthen the effectiveness of NPO's serving the Chester County region, in areas including:
 - Mission, Vision & Strategy
 - o Governance & Leadership
 - Partnerships & Collaborations
 - Operations & Technology
 - Fundraising, Development & Marketing
- Proposals must be submitted by <u>September 15</u> to be eligible for consideration.
- ♦ Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$5,000, with monies distributed by February.

- Proposals are considered "complete" when CCCF has confirmed receipt of the Grant Proposal
 Summary Sheet, Narrative & Attachments.
- Proposals are shared electronically and online with Fund Advisors, Donors & Grant Panels.
- Per IRS Regulations, applicants <u>must be</u> charitable, tax exempt organizations with 501(c)(3) certification & <u>cannot</u> be individuals.

Proposal Summary: Kennett Square celebrating Juneteenth in 2018. The first year, it was a small event, held on Historic East Linden Street. Among the impressive speakers and performers were Dr. Cheryl Gooch, author of *Hinsonville Heroes*, and reenactors from Company B, 54th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment (remember the movie *Glory*).

This year we plan to invite Dr. Cheryl Gooch and Company B re-enactors to return. Dr. Gooch's presentation is informative and engaging. Members of the 54th bring artifacts, books, and years of knowledge to share with the audience. This year we hope to utilize the auditorium in the new Kennett Library. With access to technology available at the library, Dr. Gooch can make her presentation interactive.

We are requesting \$1,100 for this worthwhile program.

1. Nonprofit's history, goals, key achievements & distinctiveness

2019 Kennett Heritage Center was organized as a history based non-profit.

2020 we began fund raising for a 4-room permanent exhibit that would relate key elements of Kennett history. We were able to raise \$ 27,000 for the professionally designed exhibit which was completed in June 2021. We welcomed Ken Johnston at the PA/DE line as he completed his walk from Poplar Neck, MD. To Kennett Square. His walk followed the route Harriet Tubman took in 1854 when she rescued her brothers from slavery.

The Center opened for visitors during the COVID Iull in June 2021 and was open sporadically for the rest of the year. We hosted several activities for the Juneteenth celebration, participated in Chester County Town Tours and Village Walks, commemorated the day in 1777 when British Crown Forces took over Kennett village (Kennett Occupation Day) and held an ice cream social. New KHC board member, Ken Johnston held a Lantern Making Workshop with participants walking in the Kennett Holiday Light Parade.

In 2022 we were able to staff the Center on weekends with our awesome docents, from April through December. We participated in the same events and activities as in the previous year. Our goal for 2023 is to continue with these events and to add a Speakers Series. We have 4 speakers lined up to talk about various historic subjects. We produced rack cards and window clings to increase awareness of what we have to offer residents of and visitors to the Kennett area. Our overall goal is to continue to expand our programs with engaging and fun activities and increase the Center's days and hours of operation.

Kennett Heritage Center is distinctive because there is no other organization in Kennett Square Borough dedicated to preserving and sharing its rich history. Kennett Square Historical Commission was decommissioned by Borough Council in 2015.
