Description of Our Key Initiatives:

Our key initiative is to provide service coordination to participants. This includes activities to identify, coordinate, and assist participants in obtaining access to needed health services and in-home supports, as well as social and housing services needed to help participants live in their communities.

Key Activities to Help Achieve These Outcomes:

- Provide visits to the homes of persons with disabilities as well as at schools, health care providers, or anywhere the consumer may be.
- Visits will be made available everywhere, including remote rural areas.
- Home Service Nurses will share their knowledge of the services and support available to individuals and their family members.
- Helping consumers to access services available to them in their communities.
- Nurses will advocate for the consumer's legal and human rights.
- Nurses will work with the person and their family and caretakers for as long as their help is needed.
- Nurses will provide health teaching and support as well as act as a liaison between health care
 providers and the individual and their family.

Specific Needs and Issues to Be Addressed:

Persons with special needs can face multiple challenges to meet their **health care needs**. Through this project some of the ways the nurses will address those needs include:

- Help with accessing affordable, quality health care benefits.
- Offer suggestions and answer questions regarding health care needs.
- Attend medical appointments with the individual to offer support and advocacy.
- Help to interpret the medical jargon that is sometimes used.
- Interpret clinical findings and offer health education to discuss measures that can help them comply with their medical treatment.

- Provide wellness education and support.
- Encouragement to avoid unhealthy behaviors.
- Help to secure funding for medical supplies, equipment, and assistive technology.
- Help to make physicians and other health care providers aware of the supports that are available in the community for persons with special needs.
- Act as an advocate who can help bridge the gap between the physician's office and the home and community.

Some specific activities may include:

- Assessing equipment needs and helping to access wheelchairs, lifts, etc.
- Assistance with inclusion and help finding activities within the community
- Instruction regarding home care issues such as feeding, adaptive clothing and toys
- Help to find a safe, accessible home or to make their current home more accessible
- Providing emotional support and help to find respite care for families
- · Contacting community agencies for follow-through after a referral
- Advocating in schools for appropriate educational services
- · Helping an individual achieve a vocational goal
- Referral to recreational activities such as camps, adaptive sports, and therapeutic horseback riding

Why It Is Important to Fund This Now:

Our staff is committed to providing a consistent, supporting presence in the lives of persons with special needs. Their primary focus is to help everyone we serve achieve the maximum degree of health and independence possible. As our number of participants continues to grow, so does the cost of providing adequate and equitable care to each individual and family.

How Our Impact and Results Will Be Demonstrated:

The nurses will continue to meet with each program participant and their family or other caregivers and together determine their wants and needs. Working together, they will develop a Goal Plan that is reviewed at each encounter. They will evaluate each participant, and document and measure the impact of the program on their life.
