--- 1. Brief mission statement and describe the distinguishing features of your organization that supports the mission of TERF and the relevance to this proposal. ---

The mission of the Belmont Child Care Association, Inc. (BCCA) is to provide a safe, supportive, and academically inspiring environment for the children of parents working in the Thoroughbred racing backstretch area located at New York's historic Belmont Park, Aqueduct Racetrack, and Saratoga Race Course. We are committed to promoting early childhood education, molding young minds, and encouraging the fulfillment of dreams.

--- 2. Briefly outline 3-5 goals for the requested funds and how these goals support your mission. ---

BCCA is seeking funding for our early childhood education program which incorporates a STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, math) based curriculum to prepare our children for elementary school while having fun and developing physically, emotionally, socially, and cognitively.

BCCA provides an early childhood education and development program for children year-round at Anna House located at Belmont Park, and during the Summer race meet at Faith's House at Saratoga Race Course. The children we serve are the sons and daughters of the New York Thoroughbred racing backstretch workers at Belmont Park, Aqueduct Race Track, and Saratoga Race Course. We provide quality child care 365 days/year for children between the ages of 6 weeks to 5 years old, opening our doors at 5 a.m. so working parents can get to the barns on time. We also offer after-school tutoring and enrichment programs, and before-school drop-off for elementary and middle school students at Anna House, making BCCA a continual resource for the children of our backstretch workers.

Our one-of-a-kind organization is changing lives at the racetrack every day and we continue to expand our programs to better serve our families. This year, BCCA is launching BCCA Blooms: Nourishing Mind · Nourishing Body · Nourishing Family to help further our mission. Our goal is to Be Transformative! by changing the lives of our families through knowledge and by providing the proper tools for success. This year, we are focusing on the importance of establishing healthy eating habits, introducing new snack options to our children in an age-appropriate way, and expanding our garden to provide more fresh fruit and vegetables for our families.

The programs BCCA offers at Anna House and Faith's House have become an invaluable resource for the backstretch families and our goal is to see our children thrive and continue on their road to success. Thanks to our early childhood education program, Anna House graduates enter the local public school system at the same level as or ahead of their peers. Our program has proven successful as our graduates often earn a spot on the Principal's Honor Roll and are celebrated for showcasing their leadership skills in the classroom. Many of our families speak Spanish as their primary language, so our children often are exposed to English for the first time here at Anna House. Our children clearly benefit from our early childhood education and development program, and they will only continue to excel in school with the support they receive from our programs.

As Anna House celebrated its 20th anniversary last year, BCCA can now track the long-term effects of providing our students with the foundation for educational success from an early age. One of our earliest graduates, Xochilt, is now preparing to enter college. Xochilt is currently a senior in high school and plans to attend Northeastern University in the Fall, where she will be pursuing a double major in Civil Engineering and Architectural Studies. Xochilt participated in our early childhood education and schoolage program. BCCA's mission is to provide an academically inspiring environment for children and by doing so, we expect to see more of our children experience success similar to Xochilt.

--- 3. Provide a detailed description of the proposed project, how it is related to the mission of TERF and how it will impact the health and welfare of the horse. BCCA's early childhood education program is available for children between the ages of six weeks to five years of age at Anna House and Faith's House. Our early childhood education and development program incorporates a STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, math) based curriculum to prepare our children for elementary school while they develop physically, emotionally, socially, and cognitively. Anna House assists over 100 children throughout the year through our early childhood program, our Olivia's Herd after school program for elementary and middle school students, and our school-age program for students who join us for enrichment activities early in the morning before school begins, on weekends, and during school holidays. The majority of children are Hispanic and come from immigrant families earning wages below the poverty level.

All Anna House students between the ages of six weeks to twelve years old participate. 98% of these children are Hispanic and their families do not speak English at home. The children are at-risk because their parents often work seven days a week and are unable to educate them at home.

--- 4. Provide a timeline detailing the expected progress of the project and specific milestones. ---

BCCA's early childhood education program at Anna House is provided year-round, 365 days/year, while the program at Faith's House is open during the Summer race meet at Saratoga Race Course.

BCCA's Early Childhood Education Program uses the Meaningful Assessment and Planning Process (MAPP) to measure success. MAPP is an assessment, planning, and portfolio process that is based on the

observations of children's interests and needs. Teachers thoughtfully develop flexible, engaging lesson plans designed for what stage children are at in their development, and then document, assess, and communicate this information with the families. The program provides a numeric graph with developmental levels that teachers use when a child achieves specific goals for their age group. The levels are listed from 1-9, with 9 being the most proficient. The graph includes social, emotional, and physical goals. Example goals include: managing feelings, making friends, eating and drinking, dressing, walking, sitting and standing, running, jumping, and catching. When a child achieves an objective, the teacher checks off the appropriate developmental level on the graph and logs the date in which it happened. Each child has their own electronic chart which will track their progress from day one until graduation. MAPP provides performance and growth reports which are then evaluated by teachers to determine if a child is on track or falling behind. After evaluation, teachers meet with parents to discuss the growth of the child and provide solutions to achieve goals if a child is falling behind.

BCCA will use the funding to provide scholarships for backstretch students to attend our programs at Anna House and Faith's House. BCCA inspires a love of learning in our children, and we are proud to see our graduates achieve accolades when they enter public school. Many are on the honor roll, identified as the leaders in their classrooms, highlighted for their mutual respect of tolerance and diversity, and rewarded for their talents in music, art, and dance. BCCA teaches them the importance of giving back to the community, and many volunteer their time on projects to assist those in need. BCCA also engages Bright Horizons to operate the early childhood education and development program at Faith's House located at Saratoga Race Course. Before Faith's House, many families were separated during the summer months as one parent remained downstate at Belmont Park with their children while the other parent traveled to Saratoga. This was due to the lack of child care services available in Saratoga for infants and young children which fit the unique hours of backstretch workers.

BCCA's total 2022 revenue as of December 31, 2022 was \$1,255,315. BCCA took a \$450,000 disbursement out of its endowment to cover costs.

--- 7. Briefly summarize your charity's past public education and research efforts. ---

In addition to our general program, BCCA offers enrichment programs to all our students. Enrichment programs include the Integrated Arts Program, Children's Gardening Program, and the Women's Literacy Program. Our programs are designed to give our students and their families access to opportunities they otherwise would not have. Our enrichment programs play an important role in our curriculum as they ensure that our students receive a well-rounded education.

BCCA's Integrated Arts Program offers an introduction, as well as continuing courses, in music, dance, visual and performing arts, and storytelling for the children of Anna House. We invite professionals from each of these specialties to lead classes that allow our students to explore different art forms. This program helps to stimulate and develop imagination and critical thinking. The Integrated Arts Program classes are provided to a total of 6 classrooms, which includes all our students who range in age from infancy to school-age (6 weeks old to 12 years old).

Our Children's Gardening Program provides the children of Anna House with a way to connect with the environment, as many of our families reside in one room apartments and do not have access to gardens. This program is a vital part of our curriculum. Each summer, BCCA works to replant and enhance our garden. This process teaches our children that things do not always stay the same, especially in nature, and that you must be patient to achieve the outcomes you seek. They learn that it is vital to nurture the garden in order for it to thrive. Our students are very involved with the upkeep of the garden as they are responsible for planting and watering everything they grow. BCCA also uses the garden as an outdoor classroom throughout the Summer as it provides so many learning opportunities. Science class is often taught outside as the children learn to identify different bugs, animals, and plants they locate in the garden. As children are naturally curious, they look forward to this time to discover things themselves in nature. During art class, the children sit and paint different flowers and plants they see in the garden. They even built and decorated bird houses for the garden!

The goal of BCCA's Women's Literacy Program is to engage the mothers of the children in our care with an opportunity to learn English while teaching them the importance of reading with their children. When the program first began, we engaged the mothers in an in-depth training program in an effort to address their desire to learn the English language. We found that they were empowered as individuals and as parents, to advocate for themselves and their families. Originally, we held small group meetings once a week where literacy and language skills were developed through the reading of bilingual books. Over the years, the program grew to include a second, more advanced class. A teacher from a local college leads an ESL class for the mothers on a weekly basis. The program has proven to be successful since its inception, as we have noted positive changes in the mothers who participate in the program. They are more confident and eager to communicate with others in English, as they look forward to exercising the skills they have learned. The mothers who have participated in the program for an extended time have taken on leadership roles by acting as ambassadors for the program and encouraging other women in the backstretch and the outside community to attend the classes. It is thanks to their outreach that the program has grown exponentially. BCCA is incredibly proud of the growth and success of this program as it has become an important part of the lives of these women. The class is not only a place for them to learn English, but also a safe and supportive environment where they are given an opportunity to discuss and work through any issues they encounter in their daily lives.




