GRANT PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

- The Chester County Community Foundation connects people who care with the causes that matter, so their philanthropy makes a difference now & forever.
- We are a collection of Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds with \$5M + granted annually to nonprofits in Chester County & beyond.
- 99% of our grants are made by our generous Fund Advisors, who make grant decisions all year.

Proposals submitted by nonprofits are considered for 2 types of grants:

Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds (No Deadline)

- Grants focus on Chester County causes & issues, but are not limited to Chester County.
- Charitable nonprofits working in all fields of interest are considered for grant awards. (I.e. arts, culture, & humanities; education; community improvement; environment; religion; health; & human services)
- General operating grants are encouraged. Nonprofits should be specific about their mission, goals, & measurable outcomes.
- Proposals can be submitted <u>anytime all year</u>.
- Grant decisions are made intermittently all year, as Fund Advisors desire.
- Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$7,500.

- For eligibility in this grant program, nonprofits must be located in & serve Chester County.
- Nonprofits budgets must be \$500,000 or less.
- The goal of capacity building grantmaking is to strengthen the effectiveness of NPO's serving the Chester County region, in areas including:
 - O Mission, Vision & Strategy
 - O Governance & Leadership
 - O Partnerships & Collaborations
 - O Operations & Technology
 - O Fundraising, Development & Marketing
- Proposals must be submitted by <u>September 15</u> to be eligible for consideration.
- Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$5,000, with monies distributed by February.

- Proposals are considered "complete" when CCCF has confirmed receipt of the Grant Proposal Summary Sheet, Narrative & Attachments.

- Per IRS Regulations, applicants <u>must be</u> charitable, tax exempt organizations with 501(c)(3) certification & <u>cannot</u> be individuals.

The Promoting Liberation to Under-Resourced Groups (PLUG) organization aims to provide comprehensive and holistic services to under-resourced communities, addressing needs such as lack of educational opportunities, housing and food insecurity, and access to healthcare. PLUG has been offering these services since 2017 and has reached hundreds of individuals and families. The organization's service coordination program serves as a hub for providing a range of resources and services in under-resourced communities. PLUG seeks funding to expand its services to reach more individuals and families. The organization plans to measure its impact by tracking metrics such as the number of meals provided, the number of individuals who access mental health and wellness resources, the number of individuals who receive employment support and sustained jobs, and the number of people engaged in educational programming. The success of these initiatives will be demonstrated through the number of people we serve as well a reduction in homelessness and poverty in communities over the next 2-3 years.

1. Nonprofit's history, goals, key achievements & distinctiveness

The Promoting Liberation to Under-Resourced Groups organization was founded in February of 2023 in efforts to organize services and resources for collectives and individuals in underserved and under-resourced communities. With our comprehensive and holistic approach, the needs we desire to address are not limited to, lack of educational opportunities housing and food insecurity, as well as lack of access to healthcare. When individuals are unable to meet their basic needs they resort to other means of survival. By addressing this, our goal is to work towards a safer, equitable and just society empowering individuals to reach their full potential.

The PLUG was founded in early 2023. However, these services have been offered since the Summer of 2017. Since then, we have served hundreds of meals to families, organized dozens of mental health and other wellness resources, supported a great deal of individuals with employment and provided homeless prevention and home management services. The PLUG has reached hundreds of youth mentoring and engaging them in thought provoking and motivational topics from financial literacy, leadership development, to career planning. Our most recent educational program in collaboration with Cheyney University was very successful. As students learn about budgeting and goal setting 80% of students were then motivated and planned to begin creating their own budgets. 100% of students were more confident in creating their own smart goals for the future.

According to the City of Philadelphia's poverty profile, over 25% of the city's population lived below the federal poverty line. This prevents individuals from being able to meet their own basic needs. Our service coordination program provides organizing of resources consisting of but not limited to, advocacy, better education, employment, healthcare, home management, meals, and mental health ultimately improving quality of life. We serve as a hub for providing a range of resources and services in under-resourced communities. Our educational resources such as career planning, and readiness, financial literacy courses, as well as access and support with healthcare and mental health are to

improve the quality of life for our communities. We provide food and housing assistance as well as other services to meet as a comprehensive approach to addressing challenges faced in underserved communities.

The hundreds of people served could become thousands. Providing education services to youth and adults can have a long term impact by empowering individuals to become leaders and active contributors to society. Studies show that initiatives that focus on improving mental health, employment, and education have significant positive impact on individuals and their communities. For example, a study by the National Alliance on Mental Illness found that access to mental health services can improve outcomes for individuals and reduce the economic burden on society. (2019).
