GRANT PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

- The Chester County Community Foundation connects people who care with the causes that matter,
 so their philanthropy makes a difference Now & Forever.
 - We are a collection of Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds with \$5M + granted annually to nonprofits in Chester County & beyond.
 - 99% of our grants are made by our generous Fund Advisors, who make grant decisions all year.

Nonprofits can submit proposals for 2 types of grants:

Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds (No Deadline)

- Grants focus on Chester County causes & issues, but are not limited to Chester County.
- Charitable nonprofits working in all fields of interest are considered for grant awards.
 - arts, culture & heritage
 - community improvement
 - education
 - environment
 - health
 - human services
 - religion
- General operating grants are encouraged. Nonprofits should be specific about their mission, goals, & measurable outcomes.
- ♦ Proposals can be submitted <u>anytime all year</u>.
- Grant decisions are made intermittently all year, as Fund Advisors desire.
- ♦ Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$7,500.

Fund for Chester County Capacity Building Grants (Due 9/15)

- ♦ For eligibility in this grant program, nonprofits must be located in & serve Chester County.
- ♦ Nonprofits budgets must be \$500,000 or less.
- The goal of capacity building grantmaking is to strengthen the effectiveness of NPO's serving the Chester County region, in areas including:
 - Mission, Vision & Strategy
 - o Governance & Leadership
 - Partnerships & Collaborations
 - Operations & Technology
 - Fundraising, Development & Marketing
- Proposals must be submitted by <u>September 15</u> to be eligible for consideration.
- ♦ Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$5,000, with monies distributed by February.

- Proposals are considered "complete" when CCCF has confirmed receipt of the Grant Proposal
 Summary Sheet, Narrative & Attachments.
- Proposals are shared electronically and online with Fund Advisors, Donors & Grant Panels.
- Per IRS Regulations, applicants <u>must be</u> charitable, tax exempt organizations with 501(c)(3) certification & cannot be individuals.

Proposal Summary: Family Promise of Southern Chester County(FPSCC) is respectfully requesting a General Operating grant for \$7,000. This funding is critical for FPSCC to continue to serve the needs of families experiencing homelessness through our Every Child Deserves a Home programs.

II. CHESTER COUNTY COMMUNITY FOUNDATION GRANT PROPOSAL NARRATIVE

1. Nonprofit's history, goals, key achievements & distinctiveness

Family Promise of Southern Chester County (FPSCC), a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, was created in 2015 to address the growing concern for families with children experiencing homelessness in the communities defined by the four Southern Chester County school districts: Kennett Consolidated, Avon Grove, Oxford, and Unionville-Chadds Ford.

FPSCC is the only nonprofit located in Southern Chester County that has provided shelter and case management services specifically for homeless families with children. There is a lack of shelter beds in this part of the county, resulting in the separation of families entering a traditional shelter scenario. To combat this, we provide short-term emergency housing by renting apartments through Square Roots Collective in Kennett Square. Families can stay in these apartments for up to 120 days while receiving intensive case management focused on finding stable, sustainable housing. FPSCC also formalized a stabilization program to address the continuing needs of our graduated families.

2. Funding request

Description of key initiatives:

Since 2015, FPSCC has provided the framework for helping families with children experiencing homelessness regain their housing, their independence, and their dignity while keeping families together. Our overall program is titled "Every Child Deserves a Home" and it is comprised of three basic components: the Post Diversion Program, the Promise House Program, and the Stabilization Program. Each component follows the same outline for case management services. The Post Diversion Program accepts families who are currently living with friends, relatives, or those that are "couch surfing." They are temporarily staying somewhere, however they are not stably housed. The Promise House Program accepts families who are in immediate danger of being homeless and have no alternatives for housing. FPSCC rents apartments for families where they can live for up to 120 days while working towards stability. The Stabilization Program serves families once they are in stable housing and supports them for up to a year to ensure long-term stability. The goal is to initially secure safe and affordable, short- or long-term housing for families with an emphasis on ensuring families are safely housed. Continued intensive case management is provided to ensure longer term self-sufficiency and stability.

Specific needs & issues to be addressed:

Chester County is one of the top five most expensive counties to live in Pennsylvania. Because of this, it is becoming increasingly difficult to keep up with the demands of market rate value for rent and find affordable and economically sustainable locations for our Promise House Program. It is our goal to avoid burdening our families with expenses and to offer families time to relax, recharge, and refocus. By covering expenses, we hope they can save towards future personal housing, as well as recover from the trauma caused by homelessness. A general operating expense will allow us to continue to maintain our housing program at no cost to families.

Why it is important to fund this now:

Homelessness continues to be a prevalent issue in Chester County. According to the Chester County Partnership to End Homelessness, "402 people were experiencing homelessness in Chester County on January 26, 2022." This number is far too high. Funding will assist us in growing our programs, which will ultimately allow us to make a direct impact on the issue of homelessness.

How impact & results will be demonstrated:

Our desired outcome is to initially secure safe and affordable short- or long-term housing for families with an emphasis on ensuring families are safely housed. During this time, intensive case management would be provided to ensure longer term self-sufficiency and stability.

To determine success, we will follow the metrics below.

For longer term program:

- 95% of participants entering the program unemployed will become employed
- 95% of participants will increase savings
- Participants will increase income (measured at intake, exit, and one year post-exit)
- 95% of participants will secure stable housing
- 85% of participants will maintain stable housing for a minimum of one year
- 30% of participants will better their education via GED, certificate, or other educational programs, including driver's
