1. Nonprofit's history, goals, key achievements & distinctiveness

The People's Pantry at Church Road (Pantry), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, has a rich history of serving the community with compassion and dedication. The Pantry emerged as a response to the growing need for accessible food resources within the Great Valley School District, encompassing the areas Malvern, Frazer, Charlestown, and Willistown. From its inception, the pantry's mission has been grounded in the commitment to alleviate food insecurity and foster a sense of community care. Over the years, The People's Pantry has become an essential lifeline for individuals and families facing economic challenges, evolving into a beacon of hope and nourishment.

At the heart of The People's Pantry's mission is the goal to ensure every household within the Great Valley School District has access to food. This commitment extends beyond addressing immediate hunger; it aims to cultivate an environment of dignity, respect, and support for those seeking assistance. The pantry strives to be a place where individuals and families can access food in a welcoming and inclusive space, free from judgment. In addition, the Pantry works to increase the quality of life for students and families in the Great Valley School District through providing holiday meals, backpacks and school supplies, and holiday gifts at various times throughout the year.

Beyond providing non-perishable items, the Pantry stands out for its holistic approach. The Pantry distributes food including eggs, meat, bread, and dairy products, as well as essential household supplies like laundry detergent, toiletries, disposable diapers, and paper products. Every August, the Pantry holds a school supplies drive and will provide school supplies for well over 300 students in the Great Valley School District. Additionally, the Pantry's commitment shines during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays when families receive turkeys, fresh produce, and extra support.

Due to increasing needs in the community and increasing clients at the Peoples Pantry, the current space no longer meets our needs. The Pantry is proposing an expansion to the existing physical space to double its current size. Throughout the pandemic and in the time since, the pantry has experienced a

steady increase in clients including a 40% increase between May 2022 and May 2023. This increase has impacted our ability to store food and efficiently distribute it to families in need. A larger space will allow us to collect and store larger quantities and provide a more comfortable environment for our clients and volunteers.

The expansion consists of two major parts. First, a new climate controlled addition on the rear of the pantry which will allow significantly more food storage to meet the growing numbers of Pantry clients. Beyond to storing food, this addition will allow volunteers to more easily and quickly restock the Pantry during open hours, leading to faster service times and increased capacity. We anticipate that moving food stock into the addition will also allow space to be freed up in the existing facility so that clients will be able to have a less stressful and cramped experience.

The second part of the expansion is an enclosed glass vestibule on the front of the pantry. This vestibule will increase visibility of the pantry, making it easier for new clients to locate. More importantly, clients will be able to wait inside the vestibule for their turn to receive food. Currently, clients often need to wait outdoors, even in inclement weather. This is a significant difficulty particularly for elder clients and clients with young children.

In order to complete construction this year, work needs to begin within the next few weeks. Funding is needed to engage contractors and start that work quickly. Currently, private donations have allowed the Pantry to complete all needed architectural and permitting work, and final approval on permits is expected within two weeks. If funds are raised in time, construction will begin in August and be completed before the end of 2023. The Pantry is continuing to seek grants as well as funds from private donors to be able to achieve this goal.
