

GRANT PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

- The Chester County Community Foundation **connects people who care with the causes that matter**, so their philanthropy makes a difference **now & forever**.
- We are **a collection of Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds** with **\$5M + granted annually** to nonprofits in Chester County & beyond.
- **99%** of our grants are made by our generous Fund Advisors, who make grant decisions all year.

Proposals submitted by nonprofits are considered for 2 types of grants:

Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds (No Deadline)

- ◇ Grants **focus on Chester County** causes & issues, but are not limited to Chester County.
- ◇ Charitable nonprofits working **in all fields of interest** are considered for grant awards. (I.e. arts, culture, & humanities; education; community improvement; environment; religion; health; & human services)
- ◇ **General operating** grants are encouraged. Nonprofits should be specific about their mission, goals, & measurable outcomes.
- ◇ Proposals can be submitted **anytime all year**.
- ◇ Grant decisions are made **intermittently** all year, as Fund Advisors desire.
- ◇ Grant **awards** typically range from **\$500-\$7,500**.

Fund for Chester County Capacity Building Grants (Due 9/15)

- ◇ For eligibility in this grant program, nonprofits must be **located in & serve Chester County**.
- ◇ Nonprofits **budgets** must be **\$500,000 or less**.
- ◇ The goal of capacity building grantmaking is to **strengthen the effectiveness of NPO's serving the Chester County region**, in areas including:
 - Mission, Vision & Strategy
 - Governance & Leadership
 - Partnerships & Collaborations
 - Operations & Technology
 - Fundraising, Development & Marketing
- ◇ Proposals must be submitted by **September 15** to be eligible for consideration.
- ◇ Grant **awards** typically range from **\$500-\$5,000**, with monies distributed by **February**.

- Per IRS Regulations, applicants **must be** charitable, tax exempt organizations with 501(c)(3) certification & **cannot** be individuals.

Mission:

The Sparrow Fund's mission is to care for foster and adopted children and their grownups by empowering relationships within and between families.

Through our Sparrow Services Grant program, Sparrow Counseling services, and Together Called retreats and other events, we provide opportunities for families in every season of adoption to more deeply experience relationships so that they are best able to heal and grow together.

Describe Population Served & Annual Number of People Served:

In 2022, we supported 41 families through our Sparrow Family Care Grant program from 24 different states adopting 52 children domestically and internationally from 14 other countries. We also cared for 48 local families through Sparrow Family Services, 20 of them at no charge. Providing high quality relational care to each of these families despite there being 89 of them, a number greater than any number before.

In March 2023, we hosted our marriage retreat Together Called for 208 foster and adoptive parents who together currently care for 419 children—173 biological and 246 foster and adopted children from 17 different countries. 100% of the families are classified as vulnerable given that they are families with children who have experienced developmental trauma. Approximately 70% of the families we serve are transracial families.

Proposal Summary:

We aim to provide extravagant, pursuing care for the families we serve. When families experience that level of care, they can best learn and grow. We hold the same value for our team. When we pursue opportunities for care and development, we not only grow our ability to help children and families, but we are best able to learn and grow both individually and corporately. Our internal collaboration and community are our most effective strategies for sustaining and growing the work we do for vulnerable children and families. We are asking for funding for a team training experience at a continuing education at the ATTACH (www.attach.org) conference in 2024, in which our staff are offered opportunities for personal continuing education as well as collaborative organizational reflection and growth.

1. Nonprofit's history, goals, key achievements & distinctiveness

When Mark and Kelly Raudenbush adopted their daughter through China's special needs program in 2010, they discovered a gap in support for families like theirs. They had received significant care from a myriad of helpers throughout the process—until they brought their child home. One year later, they cofounded a nonprofit to help close that gap in care and expand services to help families navigate the effects of developmental trauma and building attachment for the best long-term health of foster and adoptive families.

In the beginning, The Sparrow Fund awarded grants to adopting families to receive preadoption support and counsel. Over the years, The Sparrow Fund has grown both wider and deeper in services for the benefit of children and families. Families in our Sparrow Services Grant program still receive financial support for the purpose of expert counsel; but, more significantly, they receive individualized support from our team from the time they enter our program until they are home with their adopted child for a full year. In 2019, we launched Sparrow Family Care, offering specialized therapeutic child and family services for foster and adoptive families. Within that program, we have a very unique attachment-based, animal-assisted intervention component that we call Project Puppy Love with Louie, a service-trained golden retriever. We host both informal and formal gathering events and training opportunities. Our biggest event of the year is a marriage retreat for foster and adoptive parents (Together Called) with the distinct purpose of caring for them as caregivers. We also enjoy opportunities to train teachers and other caregivers to vulnerable children and families that not only help them practice what it means to be trauma-sensitive and attuned but meets them where they are and builds them up to be the best people and professionals they can be.

2. Funding request

How will this capacity building initiative impact your nonprofit?

We have three core values that support all that we do: (1) we learn who we are and how the world works through our experience of relationships; (2) hurts experienced in the context of relationships can be healed in the context of relationships; and (3) when we encourage, equip, and empower caregivers, we can transform relationships within families and communities. We have experienced tremendous growth over the past 11 years since our start. Most recently, as we have grown our team, we are becoming increasingly aware that we too are caregivers not unlike those we serve. We need to be encouraged, equipped, and empowered individually and corporately so that we can best do the transforming work we desire to do. We desire to attend a capacity-building experience for our staff that will give a space to learn, grow, and be challenged with the latest in research and information to better serve our families. It will also give us time to spend time together as a team in order to help provide us vision and planning for the years ahead.

How will this impact be measured?

Measuring the impact for this event will be more organic than scientific. The team attending this event will have the opportunity to be exposed to sessions and teaching that will provide us tools to better care for the families in our programs. The impact will be seen over the years as we care for families in small but significant ways. We believe that relationships are the greatest healing agent in trauma, this conference will provide solid foundations to practical and helpful care which provides ways to build long lasting relationships to our families. It will also provide a shared experience for our team as we work together and build our programs and network with other professionals.

ATTACH is an international coalition founded in the late 1980's with a vision that is dedicated to promoting awareness of trauma and attachment disorders in children and teens, and empowering caregivers and professionals to help them heal. This will be their 36th annual conference and it is a comprehensive programs that covers a diverse range of cutting-edge topics all geared to deepen our knowledge and understanding of the many nuances of trauma and attachment.

The timeline will be in October of 2024 for a 3.5 day conference. Costs are registration, lodging, food, and travel for the team. While the food, travel, and lodging are separate expense, it is basically an all inclusive conference to help with our teams ongoing education and team building as we share the experience together.
