GRANT PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

- The Chester County Community Foundation connects people who care with the causes that matter, so their philanthropy makes a difference now & forever.
- We are a collection of Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds with \$5M + granted annually to nonprofits in Chester County & beyond.
- 99% of our grants are made by our generous Fund Advisors, who make grant decisions all year.

Proposals submitted by nonprofits are considered for 2 types of grants:

Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds

(No Deadline)

- Grants focus on Chester County causes & issues, but are not limited to Chester County.
- Charitable nonprofits working in all fields of interest are considered for grant awards. (I.e. arts, culture, & humanities; education; community improvement; environment; religion; health; & human services)
- General operating grants are encouraged. Nonprofits should be specific about their mission, goals, & measurable outcomes.
- ♦ Proposals can be submitted anytime all year.
- Grant decisions are made intermittently all year, as Fund Advisors desire.
- ♦ Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$7,500.

Fund for Chester County Capacity Building Grants (Due 9/11)

- For eligibility in this grant program, nonprofits must be located in & serve Chester County.
- Nonprofits budgets must be \$500,000 or less.
- The goal of capacity building grants is to strengthen the effectiveness of NPO's serving the region, see page 4 for more details on the areas including:
 - Mission, Vision & Strategy
 - Governance & Leadership
 - o Partnerships & Collaborations
 - Operations & Technology
 - Fundraising, Development & Marketing
- Proposals submitted between <u>July 1 Sept. 11</u> are eligible for consideration.
- Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$5,000, with monies distributed by February.

- Proposals are considered "complete" when CCCF has confirmed receipt of the Grant Proposal

- Per IRS Régulations, applicants <u>must be</u> charitable, tax-exempt organizations with 501(c)(3) certification & <u>cannot</u> be individuals.

1. Nonprofit's History, Goals, Key Achievements & Distinctiveness

Trin'Naz Helping Hands, founded in 2021, addresses the critical needs of vulnerable individuals in our community, including seniors, veterans, and those facing economic hardship. As a grassroots organization, we provide direct assistance such as food, transportation, home support, and case management services, focusing on immediate relief and long-term stability.

Our commitment to serving the community has fueled significant growth. A key achievement in 2024 was the award of a \$198,500 grant from the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC). This funding validates our effectiveness and allows us to expand our services specifically for crime victims.

Trin'Naz Helping Hands distinguishes itself through its personalized, hands-on approach. We don't just refer clients to other agencies; we actively walk alongside them, providing compassionate care and community-driven solutions to ensure they receive the full range of support needed. This individualized attention makes us a trusted lifeline for individuals in crisis.

Our primary goal is to strengthen and expand our victim assistance programs, prioritizing immediate relief and long-term support for individuals of all ages, with a particular focus on children, seniors, and veterans.

2. Funding Request

Key Initiatives:

We request funding to enhance and expand the following core components of our Victim Assistance & Recovery Program:

- Emergency Hunger Relief: Provide fresh groceries and meal assistance, and expand our food pantry to address immediate food insecurity among crime victims.
- Children's Well-being Support: Offer essential items for child victims, including clothing, hygiene products, comfort items, and access to trauma-informed resources and therapeutic support.

- Healthcare & Transportation Assistance: Facilitate access to medical care, counseling services, and reliable transportation to essential appointments, including medical, legal, and social services.
- Veteran & Active-Duty Support: Deliver tailored resources for military families impacted by crime, focusing on housing stability, financial assistance, and mental wellness support.

Specific Needs & Issues to Be Addressed:

Crime victims, particularly those from low-income backgrounds, often experience immediate and overwhelming hardships, including food insecurity, lack of access to medical care, and transportation barriers. These challenges are compounded by the trauma of victimization, leading to prolonged instability and hindering recovery. Our program is designed to address these urgent needs by providing immediate relief and facilitating long-term recovery, empowering victims to rebuild their lives.

Why It Is Important to Fund This Now:

The need for comprehensive victim support services is urgent. While our **OVC** grant has been instrumental, the demand for assistance far exceeds our current capacity. Crime victims continue to face critical challenges, and without additional resources, many will lack access to the essential support they need. Investing in our program now will allow us to bridge critical service gaps, ensuring timely, lifechanging support for victims when they need it most. This timely intervention is crucial for preventing further harm, promoting healing, and fostering community safety.

How Impact & Results Will Be Demonstrated:

We are committed to demonstrating the impact of this funding through rigorous data collection and transparent reporting, guided by the following SMART goals:

Goal 1: Improve Food Security: Within 12 months, increase by 25% the number of clients reporting consistent access to nutritious food. (Measured by food security assessments.)

Goal 2: Increase Access to Support Services: Within 12 months, increase by 20% client connections to medical, mental health, and legal services by 15% client utilization of transportation assistance. (Tracked via case management system.)

Goal 3: Enhance Child Victim Well-being: Within 12 months, 80% of participating children will demonstrate improvement in at least one measure of well-being. (Assessed using [Name of assessment tool].)

Goal 4: Support Veterans/Military Families: Within 12 months, increase by 10% the number of veteran/military families receiving tailored support. (Tracked by program participation.)

We will collect data through client intake forms, case management records, client satisfaction surveys, and assessment tools. This data will be analyzed to assess program effectiveness, identify areas for improvement, and demonstrate the impact of this funding. We will provide regular progress reports and a final report summarizing the results, including progress toward our SMART goals.
