# GRANT PROPOSAL GUIDELINES

- We connect people who care with causes that matter, so their philanthropy makes a difference now & forever.
- We are a collection of Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds with @\$3.5M granted annually to nonprofits in Chester County & beyond.
- 99% of our grants are made by our generous Fund Advisors, who make grant decisions all year.

# Proposals submitted by nonprofits are considered for 2 types of grants:

# Field of Interest & Donor Advised Funds (No Deadline)

- Grants focus on Chester County causes & issues, but are not limited to Chester County.
- Charitable nonprofits working in all fields of interest are considered for grant awards. (I.e. arts, culture, & humanities; education; community improvement; environment; religion; health; & human services)
- General operating grants are encouraged.
   Nonprofits should be specific about their mission, goals, & measurable outcomes.
- ♦ Proposals can be submitted <u>anytime all year</u>.
- Grant decisions are made intermittently all year, as Fund Advisors desire.
- ♦ Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$7,500.

# Fund for Chester County Capacity Building Grants (Due 9/15)

- For eligibility in this grant program, nonprofits must be located in & serve Chester County. NPO's with budgets of \$500,000 or less are given preference.
- The goal of capacity building grantmaking is to strengthen the effectiveness of NPO's serving the Chester County region, in areas including:
  - Mission, Vision & Strategy
  - o Governance & Leadership
  - o Partnerships & Collaborations
  - Operations & Technology
  - Fundraising, Development & Marketing
- Proposals must be submitted by <u>September 15</u> to be eligible for consideration.
- ♦ Grant awards typically range from \$500-\$5,000, with monies distributed by February.

- Proposals are considered "complete" when CCCF has confirmed receipt of the Grant Proposal

- Proposals are shared electronically and online with Fund Advisors, Donors & Grant Panels.
- Per IRS Regulations, applicants <u>must be</u> charitable, tax exempt organizations with 501(c)(3) certification & <u>cannot</u> be individuals.

## **Proposal Summary:**

Chester County Night School (DBA Chester County Lifelong Learning CCLL) will celebrate 70 years of service to the community in September, 2025. The brainstorm of the late Mr. and Mrs. Mitman and several friends, chatting around their kitchen table, the first 17 classes offered included Typing, Ceramics, Sewing, and Spanish, to name a few. Today, Chester County Lifelong Learning offers over 500 classes during spring and fall semesters plus winter and summer sessions of approximately 50 classes. The classes CCLL offer now reflect the changing world and include computer skills, many languages, and enrichment classes for aspiring artists, and writers. With the growth of the organization, CCLL has encountered financial burdens which far exceed those in 1955. The organization has weathered the ebb and flow of the economy over the years, most notably, the effects of the Covid Pandemic. Thankfully, CCLL was able to resume operation after the pandemic, but recovering from the two year shut down has brought a new set of challenges. CCLL battles sustainability due to the increase in our operating costs.

#### SPECIFIC NEEDS TO BE ADDRESSED

Chester County Lifelong Learning operates solely on tuition revenue. In this economy, it is imperative that CCLL continues to function without impacting higher costs to our students. The increase costs of creating, printing, and mailing catalogs and the increase in credit card processing fees threaten the sustainability of CCLL. We constantly review ways to reduce spending: for the first time in 25 years we no longer have an office, we have reduced the number of courses which reduces the size and cost of our catalog, and we now rely on volunteers for jobs that were once paid positions.

Our students identify CCLL by our bi-yearly catalog of courses and events. The cost of the catalog continues to rise each semester for its creation, printing, and mailing. The creation and design of two catalogs costs \$40,000 yearly. We print 225,000 catalogs each year at a cost of \$30.000. In order to be fiscally responsible, we have reduced the physical size of the catalog, used less expensive paper, and reduced the number of courses advertised. The outlay for mailing depends upon the number of catalogs and the zip codes we mail to, as well as the postage increases by the postal department. In the last five years, the yearly expense to mail the catalog has increased from approximately \$18,000 to \$25,000. We fear the cost for paper to print our catalog, which comes from Canada, as well as the cost of postage will continue to rise. The catalog, a staple of CCNS, continues to excite, motivate, and persuade students to register for and attend out classes and events.

We have been accepting credit cards for payment since 1999 in order to make registration more convenient for our students. 96% of our students register for classes and events using their credit cards. The processing fees have increased from 1% to 3.5%. CCLL pays \$10,000+ in merchant processing fees annually. We use ACEware as our on-line registration platform at a cost of \$8,000 annually. This platform insures safe and reliable registration for our students.

The funding we are requesting would help CCNS to continue to reconnect people through the common goal of learning together regardless of a person's age, gender, or economic standing. Learning is social, and interaction with other people is vital to re-energizing oneself- something that is desperately needed

during these challenging times. CCNS builds habits of continued learning for all people. Whether in the workforce, or not, we must continue to learn in order to grow.	we are

# 1. Nonprofit's history, goals, key achievements & distinctiveness HISTORY:

Chester County Night School (DBA Chester County Lifelong Learning CCLL) is a 501c (3) non-profit community education organization established in 1955. Currently we offer classes in the West Chester and Downingtown School Districts, as well as over 70 off-site locations. The organization has NEVER received financial support from any school districts we serve. We have one full time staff member, four part time staff members, and nine volunteer Board members. We are members of two national organizations: LERN (Learning Resource Network) which provides information and resources to providers of life-long learning programs, and ACEWARE, a student/instructor data base and registration system for continuing education programs.

#### **KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:**

CCLL was honored to receive the Community Achievement Award from the Greater West Chester Chamber of Commerce in 2018 in recognition of exemplary service to the West Chester community. In addition, we were recognized by 100 Women Who Care and Benchmark Federal Credit Union to show their community support.

CCLL was the FIRST community education organization in the nation to reach out to LERN recommending they develop a Covid plan of action. LERN incorporated many of our strategies into their overall national plan for community education, recreation and college adult education programs. Quoted on their website: "We are grateful to Chester County Lifelong Learning who was the first to recognize the urgency of this problem. Their initial concerns were instrumental in LERN forming a strategic plan to help our members with this crisis."
